

## WELCOME NEW BOARD MEMBER JOANNE K. GUILFOIL

Joanne K. Guilfoil was born in Yonkers, New York, on December 16, 1949. She attended the University of Kentucky where she earned a position as a guard on the University of Kentucky women's basketball team and a position as a groom for the only Standardbred trainer/driver to hire females at the racetrack near her school in Lexington.

After graduation, she taught art in Lexington schools and lived in Georgetown, Kentucky, where she kept chickens and her thoroughbred. She eventually went to graduate school in Oregon, not once but twice. Her doctoral program at the University of Oregon included an eclectic group of courses from several departments to learn about environmental design and then be able to research and write about school architecture.


Grounded in anthropology, geography, education, and architecture, her dissertation required her to travel to and work in Alaska. After the school year, she returned to Eugene, Oregon to write it all up. Upon finishing her degree, Joanne taught art and art education for several decades and retired from Eastern Kentucky University. During those 30 years, she married and raised a family in the hills of eastern Kentucky. When her children were grown and starting their careers, she began a new life, headed for the east coast, stopping in North Carolina, and then finally landing in Delaware.

She has spent her most recent years, volunteering with the Ocean City Life-Saving Station Museum and the Ocean City Art League. Her most recent project was the restoration of the ticket booth at Trimper's Rides.

Joanne is the author and illustrator of several books, including Chickens on Delmarva A-Z, The ABCs of Chickens on Delmarva, ABCs Now & Then: Bethany Beach, ABCs Now & Then: Ocean City, Maryland, ABCs Berlin Maryland, Flying Over Delmarva A-Z: People, Places and Planes, Flying Over Delmarva: Spray Planes, Banner Planes & Bi-Planes, AFTERGLOW: The Ted Freeman's Legacy, and THE UNITED STATES NAVAL ACADEMY A-Z.

## Louis Parsons III Memorial Photo Contest Returns for Second Year

Whether grabbing a quick snapshot on your phone or capturing a masterpiece through a Canon lens, both amateurs and professionals all agree that Ocean City, Maryland, is a photographer's dream. From the bustling and colorful Boardwalk to the peaceful sand and surf and the nature-filled Assateague Island, the Eastern Shore offers endless landscapes all awaiting a shutter and flash.

With its beautiful scenery, the resort is often home to countless image competitions, but few match the grandeur and meaning of the Louis Parsons III Memorial Photo Contest, now returning for its second year at the Ocean City Life-Saving Station Museum.

Created to honor the life and legacy of dedicated museum board member and photographer Lou Parsons, the contest allows photographers 18 and over of any skill level to submit stunning images with the chance of winning prize money. Lou was more than simply a photographer but a kind-hearted and optimistic lover of Ocean City. His favorite sights, such as sunsets, the Boardwalk, and the beach are represented through categories in the contest.

This year, it is easier than ever before to enter. The museum has designed a new online platform, allowing participants to directly upload their chosen images. The entry fee is just \$5, and the platform will remain open until October 3. Winners in each category will receive a prize of \$250, and the grand prize winner will earn an additional \$250, totaling \$500 in prize money.

Plus, the new online platform allows visitors to the site to view all the images as they are submitted and vote on their favorites in a brand-new People's Choice category, encouraging greater engagement and participation. Votes cost \$1 each and are tax-deductible. People can vote as many times as they wish until November 6, and the winner will be announced on November 7, earning a gift basket valued at \$100. The winners and organizers will celebrate together in person in the fall.

After a successful inaugural year, gracious sponsor Jeff Williams knew that the contest needed to continue. Williams, a longtime friend of Lou and the former publisher of Oceana Magazine, who now lives across the country in Oregon, believes that the contest keeps Lou's memory and his love of the coastal community alive while producing even more fascinating images of the town beloved by all.

"It's a tribute to Lou that we wanted to continue after the great success of the contest last year," Williams said. "We hope that this year will be even more successful and that this contest continues for many years – even beyond my involvement one day!"

Returning to the judging panel this year are Martin Smith-Rodden, a professor of photojournalism at Ball State University, and Terry Plowman, the publisher of lifestyle magazine Delaware Beach Life. Additionally, John Sisson, President of the Art League of Ocean City will also serve as a judge.

As a first-time judge, Sisson looks forward to viewing the countless submissions. "Photography freezes a moment in time, and a good photographer draws our concentration to a singular aspect of our existence," he explained. "Whether eliciting a smile, provoking thought, or creating a sense of wonder, I love seeing how people share their perception of life through their photos."

The 2022 contest promises to be a success, with 12 entries and more than 350 votes already cast with over four months remaining for submissions. The 2021 contest generated 133 photo submissions, and organizers hope to quickly surpass that figure. True to the contest's mission, participants are carrying on Lou's legacy and feeling a sense of community themselves. 2021 winner Zachary Garmoe, a young environmental photographer living on the shore, says that the contest was eye-opening and extremely unique.

"This was the first major contest I had ever won, and it was certainly validating artistically. However, what was exciting was going to the event after the contest and meeting with all of Lou's old friends and hearing about his passion for photography, as well as their passion for continuing his legacy," Garmoe reflected. "That was special to be part of and certainly not something I expected when I simply submitted a few photos for a contest."

For both Garmoe and Williams, the most special element of the contest was meeting and celebrating in person. Garmoe felt inspired by all the new faces he met, and for Williams, the reception served as a homecoming and reunion with many of his friends he had not seen in his many years away from the Eastern Shore. True to Lou's legacy, the concept is bringing people of all ages together over their mutual appreciation for the beauty of the town we call home.

- 10. Use the telescopes just outside the museum to get a better look at Assateague Island across from the inlet.




#### ASSISTANT CURATOR'S NOTE





## Ocean City College (1972-1974)

Ocean City College, formerly known as Kirkland Hall near Easton, MD, was a regionally accredited 2-year college located at the Plim Plaza Hotel. In the beginning, Ocean City College had about 150 students and offered four general divisions of study: Environmental Studies, Business Administration, Aerospace Program, and Law Enforcement. The concept of "academic individualism" was the program's cornerstone. It is the idea that students can self-design and set their academic pace.

In 1973, the college relocated to two motels in West Ocean City - Green Gables Motel and Rambler Motel. They held classes in the motel rooms with beds and chairs acting as desks. The administration attempted to secure a permanent property in Ocean Pines but was unsuccessful. The college eventually closed in 1974.


## TIME BUILDS CHARACTER

- 6. Diebold, Incorporated Vault, c. Mid-20th Century








The first bridge built to carry automobile traffic into Ocean City was the New State Bridge (or State Roads Bridge as it was called by locals) and it officially opened for use on July 4, 1919. In 1942, it was replaced by the current Route 50 Bridge.

#### "YOU HAVE TO GO OUT BUT YOU DON'T HAVE TO COME BACK"



"There are those of us who are familiar with the old motto "You have to go out, but you don't have to come back." It originated in the days of the old U.S. Life-Saving Service and continued to be quoted for a while in the modern Coast Guard.

The motto originated with the necessity, mandated by contemporary service regulations, for a lifesaving crew to attempt its rescue regardless of weather or sea conditions. Excuses, such as "It was too rough" or "The storm was too severe," would not be accepted by the service. This requirement was in effect from the latter Life-Saving Service era (ca. 1900-1915) well into the 20th century.

But how did the old saying come about, and how was it actually codified into Life-Saving Service lore and tradition..."
