SANDY HURLEY RETIRES



Sandra Davis Hurley Curator/Director After 40 years with the O.C. Life-Saving Station Museum, I have decided to retire at the end of October. I made the decision last year about this time and had planned to spend my last summer season enjoying school field trips, group tours, programs, and special events for one more year, but alas, the Covid-19 pandemic changed everything. Fortunately, we were able to open the museum to the public in mid-June with many restrictions and modifications.

I started with the museum in early 1980 when I was finishing up my degree in Biology at Salisbury State College – yes, back then it was not yet a university! I only needed a few credits to graduate and I was taking two easy classes, Lifesaving (water rescue) and Photography. During this time my mother, Janice Davis, and my future in-laws,

George and Sue Hurley, were very much involved with the Ocean City Museum Society, which had just opened the museum to the public in 1978. One of the first things they did was install saltwater aquariums and stock them with local sea creatures. They soon discovered how much time was involved in maintaining these aquariums so they asked me if I would be interested in working a few days a week to take care of the aquariums and do a little office work. Needless to say, what started as a part-time job evolved into a life-long career for me. I started with the title of executive secretary then later became assistant curator. When Sue retired in 2010, I became the curator.

You might say that I grew and evolved along with the museum. How fortunate I was to be able to learn and work along side some of the most dedicated and fascinating citizens of Ocean City. The town's first councilwoman, Thelma Conner, was one of those people as well as Bill Wimbrow, J.D. Quillin, Granville Trimper, Irma Jester, Dot Mumford, Dr. Frank Townsend and his wife, Lillian, Faye and Wayne Watson, and Ken Jordan to name a few. Of course, George and Suzanne Hurley were my first mentors. It is because of their vision, guidance, and hard work that the museum has been so successful. Through the years the Museum Society has been lucky enough to gain members who would volunteer to do research, assist with group tours, present programs, and provide much needed support. I would like to recognize some of them and show my appreciation for helping me along the way. Retired teachers Bob and Sandy Stevens became members and volunteers in the early 1990s and helped us develop quality programs as well as leading group tours and field trips through the museum. Another retired educator, Tom Wimbrow and his wife Betty, came along a few years later and gave many hours as volunteers. Bob Stevens and Tom Wimbrow both shared a passion for the U.S. Life-Saving Service, and I came to rely on their knowledge and experience. In most recent years board members Gordon Katz and Mabel Rogers have been of invaluable help with research, writing, and giving programs to the public.

With precautions in place, we moved forward with our summer internship program. Garrett Allen, and Jennifer Brewster, biology students at Salisbury University, were brought on board in June. Their time was spent providing free programs to the public. Together they presented 56 programs and spoke to a total of 433 visitors. Moving forward with our free summer programs was a priority for us for more reasons than one. They have been up and running for more than twenty years and this summer, they provided a sense of normalcy to our visitors in a season full of change and uncertainty.

Our new exhibit, A Feminine Touch; *The story of the women who had a hand in shaping a town* opened in June and was well received by vacationers and locals alike. This exhibit has provided a spotlight for women who have helped shape Ocean City into the resort town it is today. This exhibit reflects resiliency, determination, and grit, providing our visitors with a source of inspiration.

For museum staff, the daily hum of visitors touring the museum, and attending our programs, felt like a victory. Overall, in summer 2020 the museum provided a space where families could learn and experience Ocean City's history while taking a step away from the rising concerns of COVID-19.

COLLECTIONS 2.0

The Ocean City Life-Saving Station Museum may be small, but it is rich in history. As it stands, the museum collection contains almost 30,000 artifacts and is comprised of a diverse collection of photographs, postcards, and Ocean City ephemera, along with historic objects representing the tides and times of the United States Life-Saving Service.

As the collection grows, so does the desire to share our artifacts with the community. In 2019, we excitedly announced public access to our online collection of photographs and postcards. Since then, we have steadily added items and the hope is to one day have the museum's full collection available for online viewing. In order to achieve this goal, we must first reacquaint ourselves with the artifacts.

With the help of our interns, we started this process by cataloging the museum's 10,000(+) paper archives and photographing each individual piece. Garret Allen and Jennifer Brewster, this year's summer interns, dedicated a few hours each week to this project and by the end of the summer photographed and recorded over 300 individual artifacts.

Working with the collection has not only been a fun endeavor for staff and interns but has helped us to connect with the community in new and engaging ways. For this year's History Week, we will be offering a live-broadcast, "Pieces of Our Past," showcasing never-before-seen artifacts. The hosts will share stories that go beyond the specifics of the item and into the history of this wonderful beach town.
